Brief Chronology of St. Thomas (1224/25 - 1274)

- 1215: Founding of the Dominican order ("The dogs of the Lord," a Latin pun on the name for the Dominicans, *Dominicanes* ['domini canes' = dogs (canes) of the Lord (Domini)].)
- 1220: Crowning of Frederick II, Stupor Mundi, as Holy Roman Emperor (and foe to the Pope)
- 1221: Death of St. Dominic
- 1224/1225: Birth of Thomas Aquinas (Tomas de Aquino)
- 1230-1239: Thomas an oblate at the Benedictine abbey of Monte Cassino
- 1239-1244: Student at the University of Naples (founded 1224)
- 1244 (April): Takes the Dominican habit
- 1244-1245: Forcibly detained at Roccasecca by his family, who did not want him to become a mendicant friar
- 1245 (July): Frederick II deposed
- 1245 (Fall): Returns to the Dominicans
- 1245-1248: Studies in Paris with St. Albert the Great
- 1248-1252: Studies with and assists St. Albert the Great in Cologne
- 1252-1256: First period of teaching at the University of Paris as a 'bachelor of the Sentences'
- 1256 (spring): Becomes a Master in Theology
- 1256-1259: Regent-master at the University of Paris. Becomes, along with St. Bonaventure, a chaired professor.
- 1259 (autumn): Returns to Italy
- 1259-1261: Teaches at the Domincan House of Studies in Naples (probably)
- 1261-1265: Teaches at the Domincan House of Studies in Orvieto
- 1265-1268: Regent-master at Rome
- 1268-1272: Second stint as Regent-master at the University of Paris
- 1272-1273: Regent-Master at Naples
- 1274: Dies on his way to the Council of Lyon
- 1323: Canonized a saint by Pope John XXII
- 1567: Proclaimed a 'Doctor of the Church' by Pope Pius V
