There are all sorts of messages out there – about thinness and fatness, food and exercise, and calories and grams – by which people are regularly bombarded. But why do different people have such different reactions to them? And what can researchers do to help in terms of both the messages themselves and how they are interpreted in order to reduce problematic eating and body attitudes and behaviors? This lab provides several different types of training opportunities for students, including participation in data collection, skill-building in scoring measures and data entry, problem-solving with a team, contact with adolescent girls and their moms, possibly co-presenting at conferences, and, in general, gaining a greater understanding of the process of research.
