Academic Records –

All first-year students and any undergraduate who has a mid-term grade deficiency will be mailed a mid-term grade report to the student's home address.

Final grade information is available for the students to view in the Student Academic Services channel of <http://inside.nd.edu>. This will usually occur the day after grades are due to the University Registrar from the faculty.

Address Changes –

Keep all address information current to avoid missing important mailings. Parent change of address should be made via e-mail to Alumfile@nd.edu; if this is your student's permanent home address, it should also be reported to the Office of the Registrar. Complete the Address Change Request Form, available at <http://registrar.nd.edu/>.

Student local off-campus change of address should also be made on the same form unless it has been reported during ND Roll Call. Please notify Residence Life and Housing should there be a need to change the on-campus address information.

Adding or Dropping a Class –

Drop/Add – Your student can drop and add courses for the first six class days with no financial or grade implications. The dropped course is completely removed from the student's record. First-year students must work with their advisor to accomplish course drops or adds.

Commencement –

Senior year will be here before you know it. The Office of the Registrar will be in regular contact with your student in their final year with details regarding Commencement Weekend. A website, <http://commencement.nd.edu> will provide details regarding ceremonies, tickets, and commencement speakers.

Course Discontinuance Deadline –

This is the last day a student can drop a course. This date occurs after the half-way point of the semester and thus the course stays on the student's record as a registered course that has been dropped; however, there are no grade implications.

Exam Schedules –

Many students travel home after their last final exam. It is recommended that flights home are not booked prior to the last exam day. To review the final exam schedule, visit our site at <http://registrar.nd.edu/>.

Parent Orientation Directory –

Transcripts –

Students often need an official copy of their academic record. Current students may request paper or electronic transcripts. Verification Letters –

Current students can print verification forms to use for verification of full-time enrollment and good standing for loan deferments, insurance, scholarships, or other purposes. Students can print a verification letter for the current semester or for all semesters they have attended.

The Career Center -

Students can begin to use the Career Center in their first year. The Career Center provides many services and resources through our Career Counselors to help students begin exploring career options, developing skills, and gaining experience. Four-year planning guides, job and internship seminars, career interest inventories and individual career counseling are just some of the services and resources that students can (and should) utilize beginning in their freshman year.

A Career Counselor is a staff member at The Career Center who assists students with the career decision-making process. Career Counselors are able to administer and interpret career-related interest inventories and personality assessments, inform students about internships and full-time job opportunities, offer current information about availability of

jobs, salary statistics and industry trends, review resumes and cover letters, educate students about networking, conduct mock interviews, connect with employers who recruit students in their assigned academic area, and present career-related workshops.

Health and Wellness

Health care facilities -



St. Liam Hall, located just north of the Main Building, is home to most campus health-related services including a walk-in clinic, pharmacy, and counseling services.

Notre Dame tuition and fees cover visits to the student health center. Students do not need to pay at the time of service, as charges are directly placed on the student's account.

The University Health Services and pharmacy do not bill any insurance company, except the claims covered by the optional school sponsored insurance plan. Students should carry a copy of his/her insurance card with them.

Care for my sick student -

University Health Services (UHS) in Saint Liam Hall offers 24/7 health care to enrolled students. Treatment of illness and injuries is provided by board certified physicians and registered nurses in the ambulatory care setting and inpatient observation unit.

Counseling Services -

The health and wellness of your student is an important part of your student's success in life. Physical, Occupational, Social, Spiritual, Emotional, and Intellectual wellness services are provided by the University Counseling Center (UCC).

The UCC is committed to helping Notre Dame students in crisis 24 hours per day. Please note that UCC crisis services are not available when the university is closed during the Christmas break. UCC assistance to parents will be based on the specific situation described and on the UCC's staff counselors' extensive experiences working with college students' emotional development.

Assurance of privacy is one of the conditions that make counseling effective. The UCC is prohibited by Indiana State Law from disclosing anything about any student (including a student's attendance at a counseling session) who is 18 years of age or older without his/her written permission. If you know your son/daughter has seen one of UCC's psychological counselors and if you think it is important to dialogue with your student's counselor, PLEASE SHARE WITH THE STUDENT YOUR CONCERN, AND ASK THE STUDENT TO SIGN A RELEASE OF INFORMATION AT UCC which then allows us to share information with you.

If YOU are concerned about a student and are not sure how to help, please call the UCC at 574-631-7336 and a UCC staff member will consult with you about the best way to proceed.

The University Counseling Center strictly protects the confidentiality of information shared during sessions. We are ethically committed to confidentiality and federal/state laws require it. This means that attendance in counseling is kept private and confidential. No record of a student's visit to UCC is placed on a transcript or academic record.

Student off-campus address changes should also be made on the same form. Please notify Residence Life and Housing should there be a need to change the on-campus address information.



Cars brought to campus -

No first-year student living on-campus may possess or rent an automobile or any other motor-driven vehicle for use while in attendance at the University unless authorized to do so by the Office of Student Affairs.



Bikes on campus -

Many students find that a bicycle comes in handy. Most buildings (including the residence halls) have bike racks located near the entryways. It is recommended that you purchase a good bike lock and that you register the bike with Notre Dame Security Police.



Missing class to attend a funeral -

In cases involving the death of an immediate family member, a letter from a family member or other appropriate verification is required. Your student's Rector is often a source of comfort and will work with your student to ensure that they travel home safely.

Administration (Main) Building Often called the **Golden Dome** or simply **the Dome**, the administration building is the most recognizable feature of Notre Dame's campus. Complete with a statue of Mary, the building is located in the center of campus and can be seen from almost anywhere on campus.

CRN "Course Reference Number" is a unique number used when registering for a class. It is not the same as the Course Number.

DART This is an acronym which was used to describe the registration process in the past. Although the process has changed, students continue to use the term "DART" when discussing the process of registering for classes.

DeBartolo Hall Classroom building where most classes will be held. Often referred to simply as "DeBart."

FYS (First Year of Studies) Regardless of intended program, all entering first-year students are members of this unit which allows students to study broadly in the arts and sciences and to consider various possibilities before committing to a particular college or major. On the first and second floors you can easily study in a small group but as you move to higher floors make sure you keep quiet.

JACC (A.K.A. The Joyce Center) This venue plays host to basketball, pep rallies, and volleyball within the Purcell Pavilion and is also home to Club Naimoli.

ND Roll Call (previously known as Web Enrollment) is step 2 of a two-part process (registration is step 1). It is the process in which a student informs the University Registrar of his or her intention to pursue the classes for which he or she has registered. ND Roll Call begins a few days before each semester, and ends at midnight on the last day for all class changes - 6th class day (excluding Summer Session). ndID The nd id is a unique nine digit number which begins with "90". This number can be found on the student id.

NetID The netID account is automatically generated when a student officially becomes part of the University. For more information visit <https://accounts.nd.edu/activation>.

North Quad Home to BP, Cavanaugh, Farley, Lewis, St. Ed's, Stanford, Keenan, and Zahm Halls.

O'Shag O'Shaughnessy Hall, location of many classes, departmental offices, and Waddick's Café. O'Shag is also recognizable by the clock on its façade.

Pass/Fail Grades A junior or senior, with permission from their academic dean, may, within the first six class days, request to enroll in an elective class, which is outside of the student's major and is not required by the student's program, on a pass/fail basis. This decision is irrevocable.

PE, PW Pasquerilla East and Pasquerilla West, the women's dorms located on Mod Quad.

Permanent Dismissal Permanent Dismissal is defined as permanent separation from the University with no opportunity to apply for readmission. Details can be found at <http://orlh.nd.edu/dulac/>.

Registration This is step 1 of a two-part process (ND Roll Call is step 2). Registration information for Spring courses is available in October and registration begins in November. Visit <http://registrar.nd.edu/> for more information.

An "S" grade is given to those students who meet the requirements of the course as set by the department or the instructor. A "U" grade is issued for failure to meet the course requirements.

W Grade A grade of "W" is assigned when a student drops a class after the add/drop deadline, or when the student completely withdraws from the University. Classes graded "W" are not totaled in the hours attempted or earned.

X grade An "X" grade is a temporary grade "given with the approval of the student's dean in extenuating circumstances beyond the control of the student" (Academic Code, Section 18.1) when the student's work is incomplete at the end of the term.

Du Lac, Policies, FERPA, HIPAA

FERPA Compliance and Regulations –

Parents may want to inquire about their student's grades or records, however, disclosure of this type of information is governed by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA). FERPA is a Federal law that helps protect the privacy of student education records. FERPA provides students the right to: (1) inspect and review their education records; (2) seek to amend those records; and (3) limit disclosure of information from their education records except in certain circumstances. FERPA applies to all institutions that are the recipients of federal aid administered by the Secretary of Education.

"Education Records" are those records, files, written and electronic documents, e-mail, and other materials which contain information directly related to a student and which are maintained by an educational institution, including admissions, personal academic and financial aid files, and placement records. Certain student records such as medical treatment records are excluded from the definition of "education records"

but may be subject to other laws or University policy with regard to the release of records.

The University will not provide access to nor disclose any personally identifiable information from a student's education records without a signed and dated written consent of the student. However, there is an exception that provides that the University *may* allow parents to have access to their child's student education records, without the student's consent, in the following circumstances:

- 1) Student is a dependent of their parent for federal income tax purposes; or
- 2) Disclosure is in connection with a health or safety emergency (i.e., if knowledge of the information is necessary to protect the health or safety of the student or other individuals); or
- 3) Student has violated a Federal, State or local law, or a rule or policy of the University, governing the *use or possession of alcohol or a controlled substance*, and the University determines that the student has committed a *disciplinary violation* regarding that use or possession and the student is *under 21* at the time of the disclosure.

Please note that disclosure by the University is discretionary and is not mandated by FERPA. For additional information please refer to the University's FERPA Student Records Policy and the Office of the Registrar website:

Navigating the Notre Dame Campus

Finding your way around campus can be daunting for a first time visitor. While there are numerous landmarks, the flagpole on the Main Quad serves as a great starting point for finding most buildings. Just north of the flag pole is Hurley Hall, which is home to the **College of Science**. The north end of campus includes the Main Building, the Basilica, and the LaFortune Student Center. The LaFortune Student Center is a great place to grab a quick bite or a cup of coffee.

Back to the flagpole; turning south and across from Hurley Hall, is Fitzpatrick Hall, which houses the **College of Engineering**. Due south of Fitzpatrick and west of Notre Dame Stadium is the **Mendoza College of Business**. Also on the south end of campus are the Hammes Bookstore, the Eck Visitors Center, and the Morris Inn.

East of the flagpole is O'Shaughnessy Hall (with the clock tower), home to the **College of Arts and Letters**. The east side of campus is where you will find the Library and various athletic facilities.

Walking west from the flagpole, you will find the **First Year of Studies**, located within the Coleman-Morse Center. North of Coleman-Morse, and behind Howard Hall is the **School of Architecture**.

Residence halls are located across campus and are typically referred to their location on campus by a quad – God Quad, Mod Quad, West Quad, South Quad, and North Quad.
