# Philanthropist Dellora A. Norris dies

DELLORA ANGELL Nortis, 77, of St. Charles, a multimillionaire and lifelong philanthropist, died Friday at Delnor Hosptal, St. Charles, an institution built with contributions from Mrs.

In 1918, at the age of 15, Dellora Angell was a chief beneficiary in the will of her uncle, John W. "Bet a Million" Gates. The estate was reported at various times at upwards of \$38 million. Another uncle, the late Col. Edward J. Baker, was co-beneficiary in the will.

In 1923, she married Lester J. Norris, a childhood playmate who was working

as a Chicago cartonist.

During a lifetime of philanthropy,
Mrs. Norris contributed large sums of
money and property to build educational, civil, and health facilities both in the Chicago area and in Naples, Fla.

THE NORRISES AND Baker combined to contribute the money to build a

combination city hall and power plant and the land upon which to build it in

t. Charles. In 1940, the Norrises contributed land, money, and equipment for the establishment of Delnor Hospital, St. Charles, so named for the first three letters of Mrs. Norris' first and last names.

In 1959, Mrs. Norris was named the chief beneficiary in the will of Baker, who died in January of that year at 90. Her share was estimated to be in the

In 1961, the Norrises contributed 51 acres of land upon which was built St. Dominic College, St. Charles. The college has since been sold. They also contributed 70 acres in 1969 for the site of St. Charles Junior and Senior High

The Norris University Center, on Northwestern's Evanston campus, was built in large part with the \$2.5 million

# Father Cavanaugh dies

SOUTH BEND, IND .- The Rev. John J. Cavanaugh, former president of the University of Notre Dame, died Friday night at his campus home. He was 80.

Father Cavanaugh gave up a career in the automotive industry at age 27 to study for the priesthood. He became president of Notre Dame in 1946 after six years as vice president and headed the university until 1952. During that time he set up Notre Dame's first formal fund-raising office in 1947 and guided the university through its largest expansion program.

Father Cavanaugh was born in Owosso, Mich. He received his bachelor's de-

gree from Notre Dame in 1923 and after graduation worked for the Studebaker Corp., rising to assistant advertising manager before resigning to enter the Holy Cross order in 1926.

HE WAS ordained in 1931 and studied philosophy in Rome for two years before returning to Notre Dame.

He was a longtime friend of the Kennedy family and said mass at the funeral of former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy in 1969.
